GAINESVILLE – Gainesville City Council approved at the Tuesday, January 17 regular city council meeting a resolution of the city of Gainesville, authorizing City Manager Barry Sullivan to sign an agreement with P3 Works for consulting services related to the city of Gainesville Public Improvement District and Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone.

Councilmembers voted on the resolution and three other items including a resolution directing publication of notice of intention to issue combination tax and revenue certificates of obligation following an executive session.

"This would be issuing bonds to do utility improvements throughout the city," Sullivan said of the resolution. "This is just the first step in providing that notice to the public." The bonds will be for water, sewer, water treatment, wastewater treatment. "That is what this bond will be going for, improving our basic infrastructure throughout the

city," he said.

In addition, councilmembers approved a resolution authorizing the city manager to sign a legal services agreement for development work with Messer, Fort & McDonald PLLC.

"This is specifically so we can work on a MUD [Municipal Utility District] that we are currently negotiating out with a local developer to the north of the city and so their services for this particular issue would be paid for through a professional services agreement," Sullivan said.

After approving a legal services agreement, councilmembers voted to authorize the city manager to sign a professional services agreement with amendments by MESA Real Estate Partners, L.P.

The council also approved amendments to the City of Gainesville Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual (2009) Reference No. 5.02 and Reference No. 6.05.

The policy changes don't provide additional vacation time for employees but do allow workers to earn their vacation time ear-

lier, Sullivan said. "We found out a study of other cities, we were we were offering, when we did

GISD Approves Superintendent Contract Renewal, Move Closer to Decision on Academic Calendar

GAINESVILLE – Gainesville Independent School District administrators approved a oneyear contract extension and four percent pay increase for Superintendent Dr. Des Stewart at the Tuesday, January 17 regular board meeting. The four percent increase falls in line with teacher salary increases for the current school year.

In addition, the district is still considering a change to a fourday class week.

Stewart said during his month-ly superintendent report, the 2023-2024 school calendar is "one of the hot talking points around town."

He said he presented information on calendar options, including a four-day week, during a second town hall meeting held prior to Christmas.

The next step is to gauge public support for the calendar via surveys of GISD parents, staff and teachers.

four-day versus a five-day school week, Stewart said he doesn't have a preference.

"I'm not married to either one," he said. "As superintendent of schools, it's my job to provide options to our constituents that fit the bill for us here in GISD."

He said when he began researching the 4-day calendar last fall, 41 Texas schools had already transitioned to the four-day calendar. Many of the schools were in smaller, rural districts.

Same larger districts such as Little Elm are now transitioning to the four-day calendar, he said.

Stewart also said during the report, facility needs for a growing student population and hiring additional educators are two top priorities as GISD heads into the spring.

The district is up 30 students in overall enrollment over this time last year, he noted, adding growth is primarily at the elementary level.

With our smaller students, we're seeing an increase in those enrollments," he said. "Actually, (Continued on Page 2)

Suspect in Gainesville Double Homicide Turns Himself In

GAINESVILLE - Samuel Gary Lee King, 17, has been into custody in connection with the January, 16 shooting deaths of Antonio Delgado, 19, and a 16-year-old male near North Culberson Street and West U.S. Highway 82 in Gainesville.

King turned himself in at the Gainesville Police Department Monday, January 23 and was taken into custody at 9:25 a.m. without incident, according to a Gainesville Police Department news release. King has been transported to the Cooke County Justice Center.

Officers discovered the bodies January 16 after responding to an area of North Culberson Street and Highway 82 to a report of shots fired. Officers found the two

victims near a silver-colored truck, a GPD reported stated.

The victims were transported to a medical facility and later succumbed to their injuries.

Both victims were Gainesville residents, and it is believed the two were acquaintances of King.

Chalmer is +28 in comparison to where it was last year and Edison is at +42."

He said an increase of 30 students "sounds like a very small number" but "in the grand scheme of things, 30 can make or break a school system such as ours... where many of our campuses, right now, are near capacity."

A group of 30 students hitting a particular campus at once would force the district to utilize alternative classroom space including portable buildings.

"On the flip side of that, we also monitor attendance," he said. This is not just a GISD issue, he continued. "School districts across our nation are battling school attendance,"

Population Shouldn't Be a Ponzi Scheme

China's shrinking population, we are told, poses an economic threat to that country, as well as an economic drag for us.

Here are the numbers: Deaths exceeded births in 2022 by 850,000. That leaves over 1.4 billion Chinese. That's over four times the U.S. population occupying about the same land mass. More than 1 billion people would be a lot of people in anybody's book.

Two reasons for concern are flawed. One is the idea is that an economy needs more people to grow. The other is that aging societies need vastly more young people to support their elderly.

Start with the notion that fewer workers restrain

economic growth. That might hem in the gross domestic product, but what does that big number mean to the average worker? The GDP could stay the same, but if it was applied to fewer people, the average product per capita would go up.

Worries about worker numbers often ignore gains in productivity. Labor shortages often spur tech-nological advances that let a worker produce more in the same amount of time. (In a fair world, the worker shares the rewards of improved productivity.)

Longer life spans mean there are more people we consider old, but they also reflect a slower aging process thanks in good part to modern medicine. Therefore, more people in their late 60s, 70s and beyond can remain in the workforce, especially in jobs that don't require heavy lifting. Oddly, China has one of the world's lowest retirement ages of around 60.

China's falling population has several causes. The country's one-child policy is, of course, a driver. It was imposed several decades ago to stop an ongoing population explosion

that could have led to mass starvation and related social chaos.

But another factor lowering birthrates -- seen all over the industrial world -- has been of people moving to cities and becoming richer. That helps explain why China dropped the one-child policy a few years ago but hasn't seen a significant increase in births.

Somehow a falling population sounds more desirable than a massively growing one, especially in the country that is already the biggest emitter of planetwarming greenhouse gases. China produces almost twice the amount of carbon as the United States.

Some economists express alarm that we might lose China as the world's biggest source of cheap factory labor. That could mean higher prices for the Chinese stuff we buy and thus raise inflation in this country.

But that doesn't sound like a terrible thing for American workers, who lost their jobs to Asian sweatshops. And if both Chinese and American workers earn higher wages as a result, that would be good all around.

In any case, the pandem-

ic-related disruptions of supply chains have already started a trend whereby American manufacturers are bringing their operations back to these shores. Life has gone on, and despite that trend, inflation has started to moderate.

There are also quality-oflife benefits to a steady or modestly declining popu-lation. Was the U.S. a bad place to live in 1950, when there were half as many Americans as there are todav?

Housing was certainly

more affordable for average earners. Some fret about how a falling population would affect China's crazy real estate sector, which has fueled much of the economy. But Chinese homebuyers might well appreciate lower prices for shelter.



Éducation gurus became entranced with "whole language," a theory that children are natural readers just as they are natural speakers. The old "drill and kill" had to go. If you're a parent with kids in public school, you are doubtless aware of the roiling controversies about the teaching of critical race theory and about policies governing the participation of trans athletes in sports. Those things are not trivial, but you're probably not hearing much about a far more consequential matter: how schools are failing to teach kids to read.

That's right -- failing badly. Even before the dramatic learning loss caused by COVID, only one-third of American fourth and eighth graders were reading at grade level. How is that not a massive scandal? If only one-third of traffic lights were working properly, or one-third of army

ers knew how to use a firehose, we'd properly call that a government failure. And yet the failure to teach kids the basics of reading -- despite wide-spread scientific and scholarly consensus about the best way -- has dragged on year after year and decade after decade.

It was 1955 when "Why Johnny Can't Read" became a bestseller. It argued that a retreat from phonics instruction -- teaching kids to sound out words based on the sounds letters make -- was handicapping American students. It was 1983 when a blue ribbon commission issued "A Nation at Risk," the most often quoted section of which warned:

The educational foundations of our society are presently being eroded by a rising tide of mediocrity that threatens our very future as a nation and a people. ... If an unfriendly foreign power had attempted to impose on America the mediocre educational performance that exists today, we might well have viewed it as an act of war. As it stands, we have allowed this to happen to ourselves."

Some of the findings of "A Nation at Risk" didn't hold up. For example, they cited literacy" approach, discouraging sounding it out. Teachers were told to encourage students to guess at the meaning of unfamiliar words based on context or pictures, a method called "three-cueing." That technique becomes a problem in upper grades when texts no longer feature pictures.

American education has been plagued by fads. Remember "new math?" Satirist Tom Lehrer skewered it as a method "designed to help students understand what they're doing, (SET ITAL)rather than(END ITAL) to get the right answer." Reading fads have had different names over the years, but all of them were united by their lack of scientific evidence and their romantic ideas about how children learn to read. The alternatives to phonics were all supposed to be liberating and fun and empowering for children. Instead, they did terrible, avoidable harm. As one dissatisfied public school mother put it, when children don't learn to read, "They doubt their ability to do anything in life."







The Cooke County Appraisal District encourages you to take advantage of opportunities that may be available to lower your tax bill, see if you qualify.

Cooke County Appraisal District is open to serve you, the taxpayer via telephone, email, online portal/chat, or in the lobby .

If you received a letter and/or an application request to update information it must be completed and returned by the deadline stated on the letter or you risk losing the benefits of the exemption or special appraisal (Ag use).

EXEMPTIONS

Filing any application(s) for an exemption is free of charge.

An applicant may claim an exemption on only one piece of property that the applicant owns and must be a Texas resident to qualify for a homestead exemption.

GENERAL RESIDENCE HOMESTEAD EX-EMPTION (Tax code 11.13(a) and (b)): You may qualify if: (1) you own the property; (2) you occupy it as your principal residence; and (3) you or your spouse do not claim a residence homestead exemption on any other property. (4) Attach a copy of your driver's license. The address listed on your driver's license must correspond to the address of the property for which an exemption is claimed in this application.

Homestead Exemptions: reduces the assessed value of your home which could result in a reduction of your property taxes.

Available homestead exemptions include:

- Schools: All homeowners may receive a \$40,000 homestead exemption.
- County: Farm-to-market roads or flood control, a homeowner may receive a \$3,000 homestead exemption.
- Age and Disability Exemptions: Individuals 65 or older or disabled as defi ned by law may qualify for a \$10,000 homestead exemption for school taxes, in addition to the \$40,000 exemp-tion available to all homeowners. They qualify as soon as they turn 65 or become disabled.

SPECIAL VATLUATION (AG USE)

Texas Farmers and Ranchers may be granted property tax relief on land used for agricultural productivity.

Deadline for Special Valuation: April 30th.

If the April 30th deadline falls on a Saturday, Sunday, legal state or national holiday, the act is considered timely if performed on the next regular business day.

Agricultural Appraisal

The Texas Constitution authorizes agricultural productivity appraisal, 1-d-1 for property owners. The property must be used for agriculture or timber (at this time Cooke County has no qualified timber use), meet the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area, and has been used as such for at least fi ve of the preceding seven years

Rollback tax will be imposed if qualified land is taken out of agriculture use and placed in nonagricultural use. Rollback taxes under 1-d-1 are based on the (3) three preceding appraisal • Age 65 or older; years prior to the change to non-agricultural use. Calculations are found by using the difference between taxes paid under productivity appraisal and the taxes that would have been paid if the land had been on the tax roll at market value.

Wildlife Management

Payment Agreements

Must be filed and accepted by CCAD

Available on delinquent taxes, limitations apply.

Quarter Payments

Must be filed and accepted by CCAD

Four equal installments Paid: January 31st, March 31st, May 31st, and July 31st. Any missed payments will accrue penalties and interest.

Available on a residential homestead property; if the property owner (1) occupies the home as their primary residence AND (2) qualifies for an Over 65, social security disability, or veterans' disability exemption.

DEFERRED PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

Texans may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their homes by signing a tax deferral affidavit at the Cooke County Appraisal District if they are:

- Disabled as defined by law.
- Qualified disabled veterans, their unmarried surviving spouse, or their unmarried children under the age of 18, if there is no surviving spouse; or
- Unmarried surviving spouses of U.S. armed service members killed on active duty and their unmarried children under the age of 18.

Taxes are DEFERRED — NOT CANCELLED

- Surviving Spouses of the First Responders killed in the Line of Duty: The eligible surviving spouse of a first responder killed in the line of duty is allowed a total property tax exemption on his or her residence homestead, if the surviv-ing spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder.
- Partial Exemption for Disabled Veterans: For any property owned by a veteran who is disabled due to a service-connected disability. The exemption amount is determined according to the percentage of service-connected disability as defined by a letter from the Department of Veterans Affairs Summary of Benefi ts. This exemption can also apply to spouses and surviv-ing children of deceased disabled veterans.
- Surviving Spouses of Members of the U.S. Armed Services Killed in Action: Surviving spouses of veterans who qualified or who would have qualifi ed for an exemption if it had been in effect at the time of the veteran's death are also eligible with certain restrictions. The surviving spouse of a member of the U.S. armed services who is killed in action is allowed a total property tax exemption on his or her residence homestead if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the armed services member.

OTHER EXEMPTIONS

Non-profit organizations, Miscellaneous Non-Profit, or Primarily Charitable:

Misc / Requires an Annual Application, Primarily Charitable Application is required every

5 Years.

An application for the above described exemptions must meet the statutory requirements for approval of the property tax exemption and must apply by a specific date.

Tax Abatements/Freeport Exemptions:

Deadline is April 30th / Annual Application Required

Deadline to file a late application is, June 15th for the year in which the exemption is requested. In the event that a late application is approved the property owner is liable to each taxing unit a penalty equal to 10 percent of the amount of taxes saved.

Granted by taxing units; ship inventory out of Texas that may be eligible for the freeport exemption; construct, install or acquire pollution control property; own and operate energy storage systems may also be eligible for statutory exemptions.

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY

Rendition(s) Required to be filed Annually

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property you owned on or controlled on January 1st; including inventory and equipment used by the business.

Renditions can be mailed, faxed or emailed to businessrendition@cookecad.org

Deadline for fling a business personal property rendition is April 15th.

Property owner(s) may file a written request with the chief appraiser for an extension of May 15th. pen-alties may be imposed and taxing units The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days for good cause.

If a rendition is not filled for 2023 there is an automatic **10% penalty imposed** for any business who has not rendered their taxable business personal property. If fraud has occurred, in addition to other penalties, a 50% penalty will be imposed

FEES MAY APPLY TO SOME PAYMENT METHODS OR ACCESS METHODS.

A filed tax deferral affidavit keeps eligible home-owners from losing their homesteads due to delinquent property tax. Any pending sale to foreclose on the homestead's tax lien will also cease as a result of filing. In addition, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit to collect delinquent taxes once an affidavit is filed.

The law extends the tax deferral to the surviving spouse. The surviving spouse must have been at least 55 years old at the time of the applicant death.

All deferred taxes and interest become due when the homeowner or surviving spouse no longer own and/or live in the home.

If the tax debt remains unpaid at that time, may take legal action to collect the past due amount.
